SATURDAY AUGUST 10 AND SUNDAY AUGUST 11, 1969 RULES FOR EXHIBITORS

- 1 Exhibits may be entered and registered at the RICHFIELD LIBRARY, Nicollet and 70th St., from 7:30 AM to 12:30 PM Saturday August 10. Later entries will not be accepted.
- 2 Identification of each competing entry will be by official registration tag, upon which the name of the exhibitor will be concealed until after the judging.
- 3 Each exhibitor will be required to fill out a Registration and scoring sheet to be delivered to the clerk in charge.
- 4 No one will be permitted in the exhibition room during the judging, except members of the judging committee and the General Chairman.
- 5 No exhibits may be removed until after 5:30 PM Sunday, August 11 except by permission of the General Chairman.
- 6 Exhibitors are not limited in the number of entries they may make in each class.

 Exhibitors may make more than one entry in each class provided that each entry is of a different variety and the name of the variety is specified on the entry tag as in Dahlias, Glads, Roses, etc. When varieties exist (unnamed) in color only, the color must be specified on the entry tag and an entry may be made in each color, as in Tuberous Begonias, Pansy, Phlox, Zinnias, etc.
 - Additional Class Numbers will be assigned by the Staging Committee at the exhibit table as needed. In Miscellaneous Classes new numbers may be assigned if three or more entries of a species have been made and two or more are meritorious.
- 7 Judging will be strictly on the merits of the entry and more than one place may be awarded to an exhibitor in a class provided that RULE 6 is complied with.
- 8 Awards will be made on the merits of the entries and if in any class there are no entries worthy of awards the judges may withhold any or all awards.
- 9 Section A entries will be exhibited in containers available at the Library. Location for early procurement of containers will be announced at a later date. Container size is specified in the schedule.
- 10 A Sweepstakes Award will be made to the winner of the greatest number of points based on three for first, two for second, and one for third in section A. A Sweepstakes Award will be made to the winner of the greatest number of points in section B (Vegetables) on the above basis. A Sweepstakes Award will be made to the winner of the greatest number of points in section C (Arrangements) on the above basis. A Grand Champion Award will be made for each of the best exhibits in sections A, B, and C.
- 11 Court of Honor Awards will be made to thirteen particularly meritorious exhibitseight in section A, two in section B, and three in section C.
- 12 All exhibits must have been grown by the exhibitor, except section C.
- 13 The show will close at 5:30 PM, Sunday, August 11. Everything, including container and personal property, must be removed between 5:30 PM and 6:30 PM.

Section "C" ARTISTIC

Remember the Sixties

1969 ends the decade of the Sixties. Here is a chance to show in flowers some themes of significance to our nation and community.

Arrangements must be executed by the entrant using natural flowers and vegetation in appropriate containers. Accessories may be used.

Except for class six, an exhibitor may enter only one arrangement in each class. In class six up to three entries may be made by an exhibitor.

Two factors will be used in judging:

Interpretation of theme 50% Quality of design 50%

At entry time, cards will be available for printing a title or brief description to aid the viewer in interpretation.

Class

- 1. Viet Nam an arrangement depicting war.
- 2. Space Travel an eliptical or parabolic arrangement symbolizing man's movement beyond his atmosphere into the realm of outer space.
- 3. Major League an arrangement with a sporting theme to emphasize our metropolitan area's emergence as supporter of major league baseball, football, and hockey.
- 4. <u>Hippies</u> Among the social phenomenon of the decade is the emergence of the "flower children". Create an arrangement with emphasis on strong psychedelic colors and forms.
- 5. Riots The decade of the Sixties has shown social unrest erupting into the streets in forms of riots and demonstrations. Create a mass arrangement of riotous color and movement.

6. Special Class of Growing Plants

House plants can be used as attractive decoration in the home. As in bonsai, an appropriate container enhances the beauty of a plant. Entries shall be plants potted by the entrant in a container which by shape, color, texture, and proportion compliment the plant and create a unified design.

IMPORTANT - READ CAREFULLY

- 1. Make a thorough study of both the "Schedule of Entries" and the "Rules for Exhibitors", particularly RULE 6.
- 2. The Registration and Scoring sheet is your personal registration blank. Very important.
- 3. On the upper right corner of the other side appears your personal Exhibitor's Number which will be entered by the Registration Clerk. Print your name plainly underneath this number.
- 4. Indicate the number of actual entries in the "Check Entry" columns using Class number as per "Schedule of Entries".
- 5. File this sheet, when fully completed, with the Registration Clerk when you enter your exhibits.
- 6. On each entry tag used print your personal "Exhibitor's Number" and your name and the Class No. Conceal your name by folding the tag and clipping under cut-out.
- 7. When known print the name of the variety of specimen on the entry tag.
- Registration Clerk not later than 12:30 PM, Saturday, August 10. Your assistance by not coming in right at the deadline will be greatly appreciated.

To make this the best possible show bring all kinds and colors of flowers you possibly can spare and enter them under the Lot Number shown on "Schedule of Entries". Your attention is again called to RULE 6. Prior to judging the staging committee will subdivide classes where large numbers are entered. Example: Class 6, Aster, annual, could end up as 6a Aster, red; 6b Aster, white; 6c Aster, blue; 6d Aster, pink.
