DON'T FORGET THE FLOWER SHOW August 19th and 20th at the Arboretum. Vegetable of the Year is the slicing cucumber. Flower of the Year is Hosta Leaf (3). At the flower show, national awards will be given out for the best specimen exhibited.

You can buy hosta at the auction or call club member, Bob Savory. Likewise, if you know you will need certain special plants or several flats of any particular plant telephone Dave Johnson by May 1st.

Specifics about what to look for when entering cucumber or hosta specimens in a show will appear in the June SPRAY so you will have all summer to groom your entry.

7:20 PM Dale Bachman was speaking--Over the loud speaker we heard, "Daytons is closing in 10 minutes due to the weather." Dale ran through a couple of slides and abruptly stopped.

IT COULD HAVE BEEN A DISASTER


