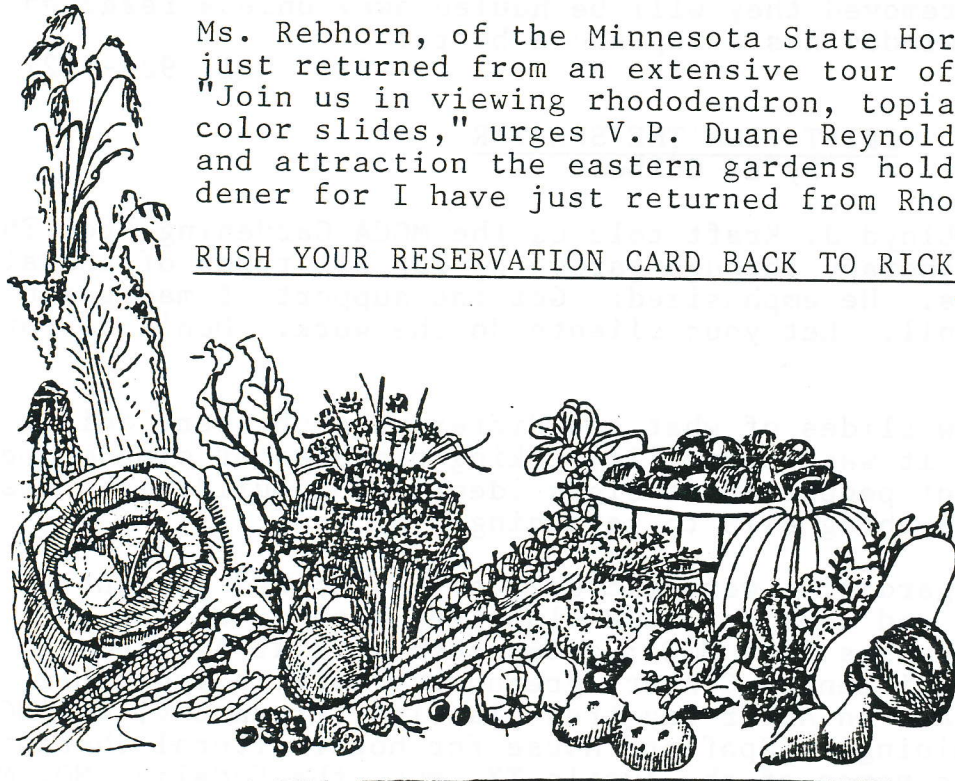

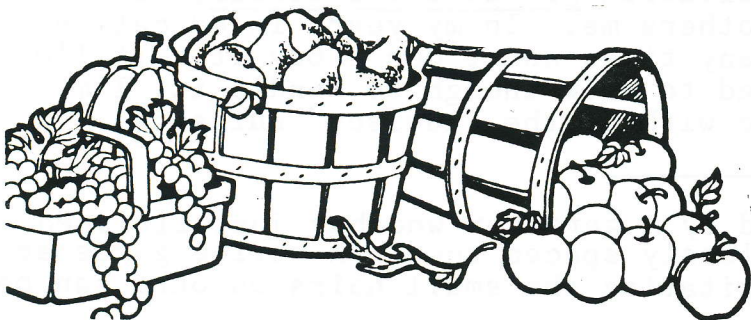

## DRIFT FROM THE SPRAYER by Ed Culbert

At our October meeting Lloyd J. Kraft told us the MGCA Gardening From The Heart program provides therapy through gardening for all types of and all ages of disabled persons. He emphasized: Get the support of management. Get your hands in the soil. Let your clients do the work. Don't do for, do with.

He told us he would show slides of what ten different clubs were doing. Judging from the slides it was, primarily, taking pictures of club members standing beside important people or of signs identifying buildings. Less than one third showed anything akin to gardening.

Among those related to gardening were pictures of raised bed gardens (Overland Park, MO. MGC and some New York club); an orchard at Ozanum Home For Boys (Greater Kansas City MGC); greenhouse work at Arizona Children's Home and at Crittenden Center; greenhouse work, a vegetable garden beside a school and an Arbor Day tree planting (Green Bay, WI. MGC); Meninger Foundation training at Spofford House for horticultural therapists. In addition I caught the names of the Austin, TX. MGC, the Sedalia, MO. MGC and the Albany, NY. MGC.

Kraft's heavy emphasis on "The institution provides the leader; MGCA members act (only?) as advisors" bothers me. In my years in education I've seen this kind of operation many times and I don't buy it. If I'm going to handle the thing, if I need to know enough to handle it, I'm going to handle it alone. I can do without the "advisor" nuisance.

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### THE (PLANT) DOCTOR'S ADVICE by Chuck Levine

#### **Underwater gardening**

Now you can literally submerge yourself in winter gardening by going underwater. A home aquarium can have not only fish but plants as well. The cultivation of plants in an aquarium can be a fascinating, enjoyable garden pursuit, especially ideal for Chicagoans who are confined to indoor gardening for several months of the year.

Don't be discouraged by the experience of those who have started to grow aquatic plants and had them rot and disintegrate; most aquatic plants are long lived and durable, if provided with proper conditions.

Here are some suggestions to help ensure success with these plants:

First, provide your plants with fluorescent lights, thought by many growers to be the key to aquatic success. This should not surprise the many indoor gardeners who have found success with other "difficult" plants by using artificial light.

Second, check with the dealer where you purchase your plants to find out if the plants are being kept in soft or hard water and at what temperature and pH level. Find out the optimum conditions for these plants and adjust them gradually, over a period of hours, from the conditions in which they have been grown to the optimum conditions.

Many pet shops sell aquatic plants; many more should. Ask the shop owner about plants; encourage him to sell more and to provide a greater variety. Aquarium gardening can provide you with a new and unusual outlet for your gardening abilities. Avoid plastic plants; your fish know the difference and so will you.

The plants listed here are readily available and easy to maintain in the home aquarium: Aponogeton, Cryptocoryne, Echinodorus, Hygrophila, Sagittaria and Valisneria.

This year once again we have been invited to make wreaths at Klier's Nursery, 5901 Nicollet Avenue. This has become a traditional event for the Men's Garden Club and always occurs the Friday after Thanksgiving. About 40 enthusiastic wreath makers come fairly early in the evening to try their hand at this art form. A large number of them are complete novices. Howard's wife, Ardis, cheerfully shows beginners how to make a Christmas wreath. She coaches them through each step and believe it or not, everyone ends up with a pretty decent product. Ardis appears to have the patience of a pine tree.

The wreath making started about 30 years ago with Howard's father. Some friends of his from the Richfield Garden Club would get together in a member's home to make wreaths and centerpieces for the Christmas party. They alternated homes each year making the wreaths in basements and amusement rooms. Finally the wives put their feet down to stop this in-home wreath making. They couldn't get the needles out of the carpets, nooks and crannies. Howard Klier's Dad said, "Come on down to my place - we've got plenty of room, we're used to wreath making, and the mess will be controllable. We can get the materials right there." The undertaking moved to Klier's and never left.

Howard's partner, Don, and Don's wife make the cookies which are present in bounteous supply. Howard and his wife make venison meatballs. Also generously supplied are wine, coffee and tea. The Richfield Club disbanded many years ago and 10-12 members came to join the Men's Garden Club of Minneapolis. They brought this tradition with them. In addition to the Kliers, Larry Bachman, Carl Holst and a former member named Miller were among those making the move and bringing the wreath making with them.

In recent years, Albert Rahlenbeck has come with his trusty assistant. Albert made wreaths professionally when he lived in Germany. He turns them out like a machine - each a perfect specimen. Last year he made five wreaths for our Christmas party which were given as door prizes to be taken home when the party was over. Albert also made a few additional wreaths for smooth talking club members. Albert has dropped out of our club this year but I have invited him back to assist us with wreath making. Albert says he is delighted at the prospect and will make every effort to attend this thoroughly enjoyable evening.

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Jane Pezlar from the Minneapolis Society for the Blind has been in contact with me re their relation with the MGCM. The MSB is having a 75th anniversary in two years and would like to include the Garden Club in their publicity activities. We are currently examining braille signs and tags which can be put up in the garden, but there is much more to be done.
