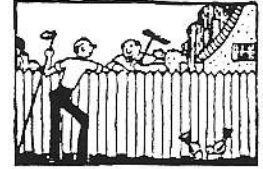
So thanks again for letting me be your president. I can now say, "I've been to the city and you'll find me in the garden next year".

Another impressive feature was the

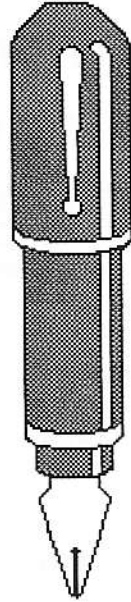
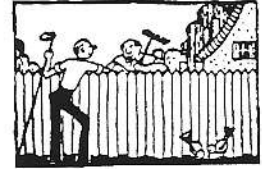
For some, other points of interest were the automation and cleanliness aspects. Each space, before it is used, is completely sterilized against insects and fungus. Some areas, particularly those for starting of new plants and those where losses become a disaster, have entry areas just like in a hospital. These entry areas are places where the people who enter the ultra clean houses don clean suits and walk through a foot bath of insecticidal water to make sure nothing is carried into the clean room. The automation was also impressive. Water, humidity, fertilizer, light requirements and temperature are all controlled. The track system for plant movement was also state of the art and added to the impressiveness of the operation.

From what I heard, it was a great tour and enjoyed by all (except for the wait for a new bus). But even that can be fun; think of all that good conversation you had.

Vice President's Report

The January program is arranged and the remaining programs for the year 2000 will be scheduled by the new Vice President.

Committee Reports

- Calendars: About half of them are sold.
- Holiday Party: There was a meeting October 20 with the caterers who had ideas for keeping the food costs under control. Serving bowls at the church for good family style service are not available, thus a restaurant style sit down service will be used. Turkey costs will be reduced by the caterers cooking some combination

- Garden Spray: There will be a return of "Lazy Gardener" articles but Chuck still needs more articles and program note takers.

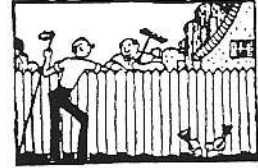
Old Business

In 1954 he married Norma at Hennepin United Methodist Church and continued this marriage for 45 years. They became parents of three children; David, Linda and Patti.

Bud was a mortgage banker by vocation, but he loved his gardening. He was a member of MGCM since 1961 (that's 38 years) and his garden was on tour many times. We thank Grant "Bud" Christensen for being part of MGCM. We wish his family peace in his passing and joy in his memories.

Bits and Pieces

Here are a few items I found of interest while reading and visiting gardens.

The Perennial Plant Association

The Association has chosen its 2000 Perennial Plant of the Year. It is the *Scabiosa columbaria* 'Butterfly Blue'. This plant is disease and insect resistant, attracts butterflies, can be mass planted or used in the front of the border. An easy plant to grow and hardy to zone 3. Not only that, it is long blooming and will repeat its lavender blue flowers with deadheading. Sometimes called the pincushion flower.

Brooklyn Botanic Garden News

Researchers have found that seedlings do better (faster growth and reduced disease) in a growing mixture of 30% peat moss, 40% vermiculite and 30% composted cattle manure.

•••

When you fertilize plants started indoors, you can expect enhanced flowering if you use a fertilizer that has three times the phosphorus as it has nitrogen.

•••

Slugs were found to be less damaging if overhead watering was done two hours after sunrise rather than in the evening.

The Avant Gardener

A four year study by the Chicago Botanic Garden tested 22 varieties of Phlox to assess their mildew resistance. The best plants in the test are:

- *P. carolina* 'Reine du Jour'
- *P.* 'Challakoochie'
- *P. paniculata* 'Katherine'
- *P. pulehra* 'Morris Berd'

Some varieties almost as good are:

- *P. paniculata* 'Bright Eyes'
- *P. paniculata* 'David'
- *P. paniculata* 'Franz Schubert'

The worst ones:

- *P. maculata* 'Alpha'
- *P. maculata* 'Omega'
- *P. maculata* 'Rosalinde'

Editors note: If you purchase any of these, make sure you check their hardiness. The article did not mention any zone requirements. More information on the study can be found in the November/December issue of The Gardener.

From A Garden Tour

While I toured a garden at the TGOA/MGCA convention, I saw something striking that shade gardens could use. It is *Polemonium caeruleum* 'Brise d'Anjou'. For those who aren't familiar with the scientific name, this is a variegated Jacob's ladder. It is hardy to zone 2, likes moisture retentive soil and dappled shade. It is a good companion to dark green Hostas. If you find it for sale, let me know.

MGCA History

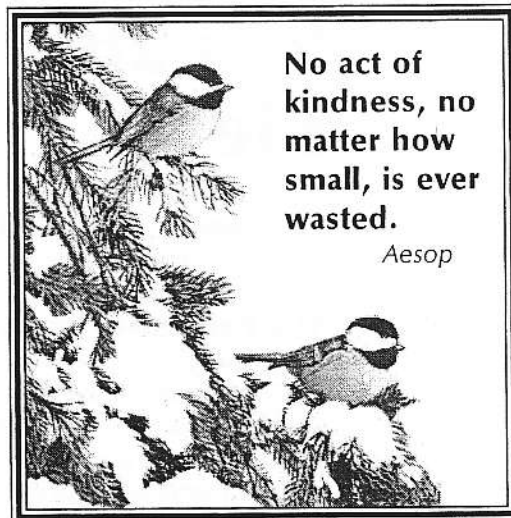
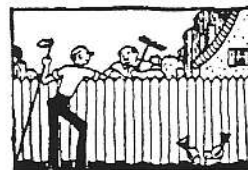
Many new members have joined the ranks of MGCM in the last few years. These members, and possibly some others, have never heard the history of the Gardeners of America/Men's Garden Clubs of America. I found this in *The Granville Gardener*:

"Back in 1927, Leo Nack won a top prize of \$1,000 given by a leading newspaper for the best garden in Chicago. He discovered that a number of other men were also interested in gardening. On

February 28, 1927, sixteen other amateur gardeners met in Chicago to discuss some sort of organization wherein they could meet and talk over their mutual interest, "Gardening". On March 15, 1928, the first men's garden club was established.

Ding Darling, the famous cartoonist, next organized a club in Des Moines, Iowa. Ft. Wayne, Indiana, was the third organization followed by Aurora, Illinois. W. B. (Wild Bill) Lathrop was the father of the Aurora Club. Bill immediately hit upon the idea of bringing the four clubs into an affiliated organization, so on September 26, 1932, there was a meeting of the representatives of these four clubs which resulted in the organization of the Men's Garden Clubs of America. The first National Convention was held in Chicago during the Century of Progress, July 29, 1933."

If you wondered when the Minneapolis club was established, it was October 1, 1942. It's now been 57 years that MGCM has been a garden club affiliated with the TGOA/MGCA.



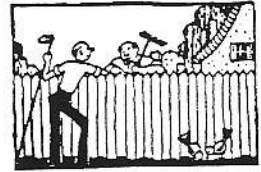
Y to K Calendars

The following was from a memo of a Fortune 500 company.

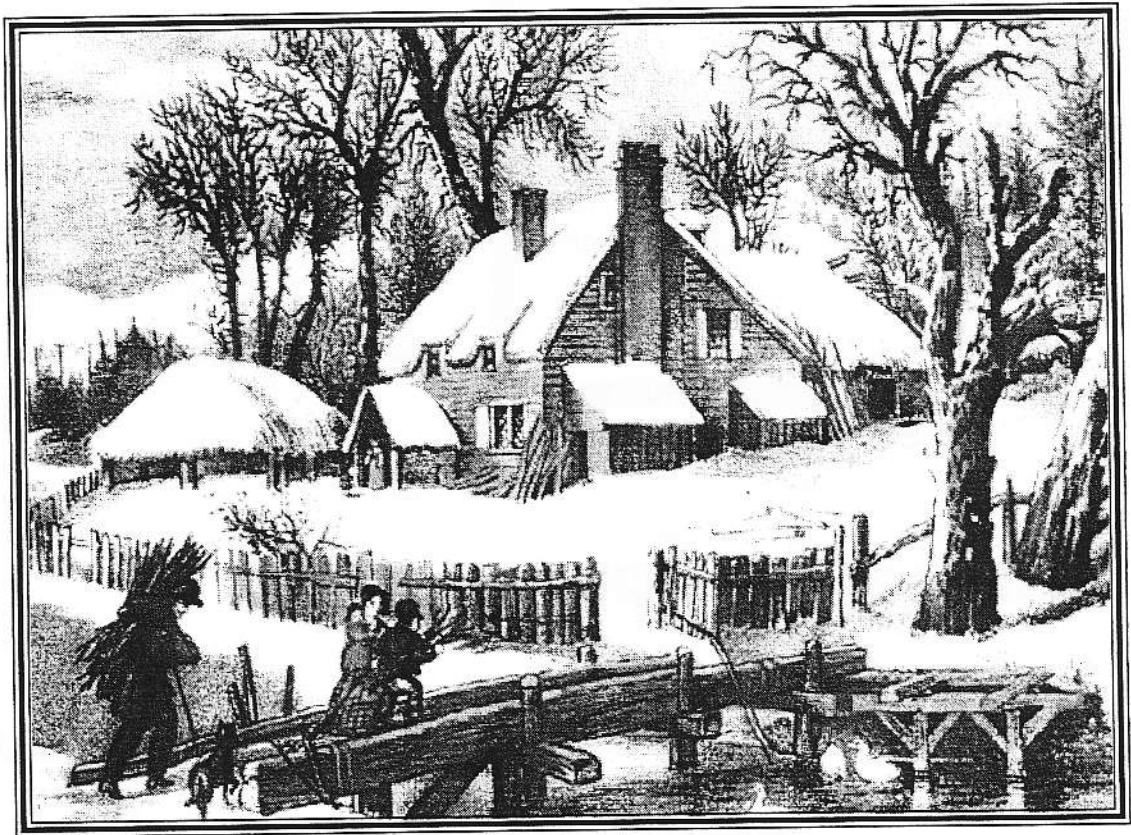
To: Corporate Administration
