

Andy Marlow was invited to report on a possible project for the club to produce two pilot programs about gardening to be featured on cable community television programming.

President's Report: A chairman for the FFF Show is still needed.

The Fundraising Tea put on by Kay Wolfe and committee raised \$520 for the Lyndale Park Garden and scholarships.

New Business: The motion was made and approved by the Board to proceed with the two pilot programs about gardening to be featured on cable community television programming. The Board believes the programs will be both educational and give name recognition to MGCM.

The Board approved the awarding of two \$500 scholarships in 2009.
